Unable to know whether their child will be hearing or deaf until birth, it's a beautiful, nuanced depiction of their journey. The clever use of sound and silence immerses us in Ángela's experience and explores the struggles she faces, given the inadequacies of the world for deaf people.

When English couple Anne and Dave arrive, their presence sets off a chain of events that leads to a mysterious disappearance. Islands is a contemporary, intelligent thriller with noirish undertones and stylistic echoes of Alfred Hitchcock and Patricia Highsmith, stunningly shot against the sun-drenched volcanic landscapes of the Canary Islands.

Taking refuge in the Casbah of Algiers, Pépé Le Moko - the chief of a band of robbers - falls in love with a beautiful young woman named Gaby. Unfortunately, their romance is a short one since Slimane, an informer, sets a trap for Pépé to get him to leave his haunt. Both a king and prisoner, his fate lies in the hands of the Parisian beauty.

Initially released during France's cinematic Golden Age in 1937, Julien Duvivier's timeless romantic thriller starring notable French talent Jean Gabin is deemed by critics as one of the most enjoyable films ever made. It was remade twice in the US and had a clear influence on Graham Greene's Brighton Rock and Gillo Pontecorvo's The Battle of Algiers.

The influential classic returns to the silver screen now fully restored.

Teenage best friends Doe and Muna are heading off on what seems like the trip of a lifetime. Quiet, observant Doe hasn't travelled since arriving in the UK as a Somali refugee aged three. Muna, sharp and fearless with Pakistani roots, leads them through airport security and into the unknown. But this isn't a holiday. The girls are bound for Istanbul, planning to cross into Syria to begin a new life they believe holds purpose and meaning. When

their fixer fails to appear, panic sets in, but turning back isn't an option. Alone in a foreign city, they must improvise fast, pushing the limits of their courage, their faith, and their friendship. Directed by Young Vic's Nadia Fall in her debut feature, Brides is a bold, emotionally charged coming-of-age drama exploring the paths young British Muslim girls navigate in search of identity and belonging. Told with compassion and urgency, it's a gripping story of loyalty, lost innocence, and the quiet desperation that drives radical choices.

Winner of Best Documentary at the Johannesburg Film Festival 2024 COMRADE TAMBO'S LONDON RECRUITS unfolds, after decades of secrecy, a nail biting journey of

espionage with those who risked it all in taking on one of the 20th century's most feared and brutal regimes.

By the late 1960s, the Apartheid regime in South Africa had reached brutal new heights. Nelson Mandela and other freedom fighters had been imprisoned, killed or forced into exile. The ANC was outlawed and broken. In efforts to reinvigorate support for the liberation struggle, exiled ANC leader Oliver Tambo lit the fuse on a plan that saw young British women and men undertake missions on the ground in South Africa disguised as honeymooners, holiday makers and business trippers.

The film features interviews from surviving 'London Recruits' and freedom fighters who recount their courageous and intriguing stories of espionage and danger to create what Variety called 'an edge of your seat thriller' with 'jaw dropping twists'.

There will be a live Q&A with director Gordon Main and one of the London Recruits after this screening.

GROUNDED: Fashion's Entanglements with Nature

Dust to Dust

Dir. Kôsai Sekine, Japan, 2024, 89min, Japanese and English. With descriptive subtitles.

How can haute couture help to solve the ecological harm caused by ready-to-wear's ferocious pace? *Dust to Dust* follows Tokyo-based designer Yuima Nakazato meandering through Nairobi's Gikomba Market, the world's largest hub for discarded clothes: 'Knowing that anything I say is going to be completely useless... is kind of a new experience for me. Now I know what it feels like to be truly lost for words,' he says. The documentary trails the development of a new non-woven material made using two 50-kilogram bundles of clothing procured from Kenya.

Nakazato's ethereal garments presented a year later in Paris offer a reimagining of the fashion world at its creative and conscious best.

We are delighted to present a special children's programme showcasing the harmonious collaboration between humans and non-human species, while celebrating the power of animation to bring the impossible to life. Across the history of cinema, children's animated films have conveyed profound wisdom by exploring the cooperation of human and non-human species and contemplating the uncertain boundary where the body ends and nature begins. From the delicate silhouettes in Lotte Reiniger's *Thumbelina* and the resourceful tiny mammal in *How the Mole Got His Trousers* to the vibrant and sensuous biodiversity celebrated in *Idodo* and *The Butterfly*, these films remind us that adornment is not the

sole preserve of humankind. Felix the Cat's slapstick antics in *Comicalamities* and the witty animal world of *A is for Ant*, bring a touch of hilarity to themes of metamorphosis, empathy and adaptation. Together, these stories celebrate dress as both a wondrous and profoundly strange language concocted by nature and human creativity alike.

A is for Ant

UK, 2024. Dir. Jack Davison in collaboration with Shona Heath, 10min

Combining sculptural costumes with live-action performances, cameos by animals, and experimental film effects, photographer Jack Davison and costume and set designer Shona Heath reimagine letters as representations of animals and insects. By distorting scale and magnifying bodily presence, their disarmingly eccentric zoo alphabet temporarily places humans and animals on a level playing field. Can you tell who is who?

Felix the Cat: Comicalamities

USA, 1928. Dir. Otto Messmer and Pat Sullivan, 8min In this silent cartoon, Felix endeavours to transform a 'homely dame' into a glamorous Hollywood starlet, using nature's treasures. As an underwater appointment with the Mother of Pearl and a subsequent hunt for a fur coat both turn hazardous, Felix is forced to rely on the animator's hand to get him out of trouble.

How the Mole Got His Trousers (Jak krtek ke kalhotkám přišel)

Czechia, 1957. Dir. Zdeněk Miler, 12min

The much-beloved character Krteček was conceived as the protagonist in this first-ever episode, which illustrates the making of trousers – a child-friendly, step-by-step guide to linen textile production. Completed in 1957, the film received critical acclaim, winning two Golden Lions at the Venice Film Festival. Since then, the resourceful Little Mole has become an iconic character worldwide, promoting friendship and cooperation between species.

Idodo

USA/Papua New Guinea/Switzerland, 2021. Dir.Ursula Ulmi, 10min

How did reef fish acquire their beautiful colours? Based on an ancestral legend by a local clan of Papua New Guinea, Ursula Ulmi's animation presents an unexpected reversal of the usual narrative in which humans borrow their garb from nature. Created in collaboration with local Papuan filmmakers, artists, performers, and musicians, Idodo is a poetic exploration of bodily decoration as an art form that holds both cultural and natural significance.

The Butterfly

Russia, 1972. Dir. Andrey Khrzhanovsky, 10min A city boy becomes entranced by a butterfly and the beguiling creature leads him away from his technological world into the mesmerising and untamed realm of nature. Evoking the butterfly as a timeless symbol of metamorphosis, this intricately crafted animation brings a touch of mysticism to depicting the boy's physical and spiritual transformation.

Thumbelina

UK, 1955. Dir. Lotte Reiniger, 10min
This enchanting silhouette animation brings Hans
Christian Andersen's tale to life with exquisite detail.
Nature plays a pivotal role in Thumbelina's adventures, while her delicate dress and adornments reflect her fragility and connection to the natural world.

Donkey Skin (PG)

Jacques Demy's *Donkey Skin* adapts Charles Perrault's eponymous fairy tale into a surrealist musical that interrogates taboos, agency and cultural mythmaking. Like the director's earlier film *The Umbrellas of Cherbourg*, the film's candy colours belie its subversive examinations of sex and class, with a young woman caught at the centre. A young princess is dressed in magnificently gaudy gowns, yet in a bid to escape her father's marriage proposal, she dons a donkey skin before running away from her kingdom. She is enrobed by the shame and degradation of her circumstances – but there is freedom to be found at the edge of her hybrid existence. The film offers a fantastical slant on the transformative effects of what we wear, the complexities of fur, and how our proximity to animality can liberate us from the bounds of conventional fashions.

Don't Let's Go To the Dogs Tonight (15)

The 6pm screening on Thursday 30 October will be introduced by Dr Beth Pyner.

Dr Beth Pyner is a Lecturer in English Literature and Visual Culture at Cardiff University, specialising in women's contemporary memoir across film, photography, illustration, and gallery-based art. Having published research about the complex racial and gender dynamics in the written version of Alexandra Fuller's memoir, Beth introduces its adaptation into film.

In this adaptation of Alexandra Fuller's memoir, actordirector Embeth Davidtz examines the collapse of colonialism through the eyes of eight-year-old Bobo as the 1980 election in Rhodesia that would create Zimbabwe approaches and the brittle truce between white landowners and the Black majority workers fractures. Nicola, mother to young, perceptive Bobo sleeps with a machine gun, ready to use it for "terrorists" or snakes,

whatever threatens her family. She's taught her daughter that any African could be a terrorist. *Don't Let's Go to the Dogs Tonight* shifts with admirable nuance from the coarse nihilism of the white adults who know their days of comfort are numbered, to the magic seen through Bobo's innocent eyes, to the razor-sharp long view of Sarah and Jacob who work for the Fuller family until they can reclaim land that was taken from them.

No one emerges as an unblemished hero in Davidtz's film, nor is anyone an absolute villain.

After winning the Grierson Award for Best Documentary at last year's London Film Festival, *Mother Vera* is the visually stark and striking film inspired by co-director Alys Tomlinson's photographic series Ex-Voto. In a hidden Orthodox monastery in Belarus, the film weaves the inner world of Vera, an unorthodox young nun, with the community surrounding her that saved her life. Now after 20 years as a monastic, Vera faces deep inner conflict. She must confront her past and trust her instincts to find the liberation she desires.

Gentle, Angry Women (12A) + intro by Barbara Santi

Meet three fearless young women who embark on a 110-mile march to retrace the footsteps of Greenham Common's pioneering female protesters from 40 years ago. Unaware of the longest female-led protest in British history, a new generation of young female activists is standing up to fight for the issues of their time, as well as being teenagers and finding their place in a turbulent world.

We meet Poppy (16), Xanthe (17), and Evie (19) as they discover the largely overlooked Greenham Common Women's Peace Movement, where 30,000 women

protested against nuclear missiles. Retracing their steps, the young women embark on a unique intergenerational exchange with their activist counterparts, revealing a journey of self-discovery and a timely narrative of feminist activism. A coming-of-age documentary that sparks urgent conversations about hope, action and change.

Considered by many the greatest horror film ever made, this masterful cinematic nightmare of demonic possession is a special treat for our Halloween double-bill. When young Regan starts acting odd - levitating, speaking in tongues - her worried mother seeks medical help, only to

hit a dead end. A local priest, however, thinks the girl may be seized by the devil and he makes a request to perform an exorcism. The church sends in an expert to help with the difficult job and a cinema classic is born.

The Exorcist remains every bit as chilling now as it did in 1973; a vision of supernatural terror soundtracked by Mike Oldfield's spine-chilling Tubular Bells. Revisit this game-changing, enduringly controversial genre classic this Halloween.

Radiohead X Nosferatu: A Symphony of Horror (PG)

What better way to spend Halloween than revisiting one of the most iconic horror films of all time. This reimagining of the iconic *Nosferatu* (1922) features Radiohead's Kid A (2000) and Amnesiac (2001) albums.

An unauthorized adaptation of Bram Stoker's Dracula, Nosferatu (1922) is the quintessential silent vampire film, crafted by legendary German director F. W. Murnau. Rather than depicting Dracula as a shape-shifting monster or debonair gentleman, Murnau's Graf Orlok (Max Schreck) is a nightmarish, spidery creature of bulbous head and taloned claws — perhaps the most genuinely disturbing incarnation of vampirism yet envisioned. Don't miss out on the chance to experience this imaginative new take on an iconic horror classic!

On Friday 31 October, the film will be preceded by the short film KNELL.

Knell (recommended age 15+)

Dir. Dean Ferris, UK, 2025, 12 mins.

Shot in Exeter and Newton Abbott, this folk horror short film follows a couple on a walk through the woods. They hear a faint sound of a bell and follow the noise to a sinister hut filled with strange symbols, and a single flower. What starts as a simple act of affection leads to a frightening conclusion for them both.
